

"Enjoy the Journey"

An interview with Ms. Nooraine Fazal

Nooraine Fazal - writer, golfer, orator, and Inventure's Founding CEO & Managing Trustee - talks to us about Inventure, its beginnings and her own journey.

Yash: It must have taken a lot of courage to start a school as a non-educator 15 years ago. What was the journey like? Any regrets?

NF: We went from concept to opening school, all in 8 months! We actually started on a farm because construction of the school building was still in progress. I wouldn't say I regret it as I believe everything is a learning opportunity. However, I don't think I could do it again, mainly because there's a lot more to lose now. Back then, there was nothing to lose other than not giving it a shot.

Sahana: Any defining events in the school's history that helped shape Inventure into what it is today? What did you learn from the experience?

NF: There have been challenging times and some things that really shook the foundations of the school. We started school with 29 students and about 19 teachers... and our principal left within the first term! In our early years, people said Inventure was too experimental, kids talk too much, students look happy so they can't possibly be learning, too much sports... Many schools in India, possibly around the world, are very autocratic, very top-down. Inventure has never been top-down, we don't believe discipline is making students walk around with fingers on their lips and hands behind their backs, so to speak.

But these times have also been our defining moments. For example, at the start of our third year, we lost 50% of our students and teachers



People left because they didn't have confidence in the school, but for those of us who stayed, it made us more determined than ever to prove that the Inventure way works.

I believe we learn more from our failures than our successes. I also think that when you fight for your very survival, with everything seemingly stacked against you, and you learn how to tough it out, that definitely defines you as an institution as well as a person.

For me personally, one of the biggest challenges around that time was when I lost my voice. Doctors said I had to stop talking completely or I'd require surgery. I had to communicate with people through messages for months. Needless to say, when you're trying to set up an institution from ground up, it's challenging. I even remember interviewing Ms. Benjamin, who was effectively our founding principal, on my laptop, because I simply couldn't speak.

Sahana: I've never heard this story before! Is there anything you learnt through this experience?

NF: It was a transformational experience. I really got comfortable in my skin and with my thoughts. I used to be someone who could never sit still, always meeting people, talking, exploring new places, trying new sports... Losing my voice sort of forced me to go back and get in touch with myself, with the person I used to be as a kid, someone who was often in my own make-believe world.

Arya: What was your original vision for Inventure? Has this vision held up? What elements of the Inventure culture would you consider unchangeable?

NF: Our original Vision has not really changed - it has always been about helping every child be the best they could be. We have added 'Be socially responsible' to our Core Purpose. We felt that humanity as a whole was headed for trouble with the current 'I, Me, Myself' culture, that it cannot just be about the individual, and instead must also be about contributing to positive change.

The things I consider non-negotiable about our culture are being happy, nurturing, adaptable, innovative, humane, friendly. What I absolutely love about the Inventure community is that we come together and make things happen. As a community, we have each other's backs. We all align towards the same core purposes, the same values, the same vision - we want the same things.



Yash: Are there any achievements at Inventure you're particularly happy about?

NF: If you look at traditional measures of success, we've had plenty. 38 students who have topped all India & worldwide, a great sports program and amazing productions. Inventure is now ranked #1 in Karnataka and Bangalore and has retained #3 all-India ranking (Education World Cfore Survey 2020). We were able to contribute Our Voice to the Child Safety Policy of the State of Karnataka and were invited by the Prime Minister's Office to share our views on the National Education Policy. I'm really happy with the community work we're doing Ramagondanahalli, public-private as а partnership.

Inventure certainly makes а positive difference in our students' lives... Take for example one of our first students who had learning challenges. He took an assessment in Grade 8 which recommended that he not do his ICSE exams. However, his teachers had complete faith in his ability to do well in his ICSE exams. And guess what - he got an overall 74%, and he went on to graduate as an engineer. I remember another student who would not even make eye contact during the admissions interaction. A few years at Inventure and he was participating in school assemblies and became a very successful athlete. When he won his pet event at the annual athletics meet, the whole school celebrated. Moments like these, helping every child achieve their best, including those who most would not give an opportunity to, are what makes it all worthwhile.

Arya: Through all your experiences so far, have you developed a philosophy on life?

NF: Be the best possible person you can be and contribute to making the world a better place. You reap what you sow. Don't get too caught up in what you can't control. Nobody owes you anything, you've got to make things happen for yourself. We're all works in progress, and we deserve opportunities to do things better.

Sahana: To what extent do you believe that women are equals in the education sector in India right now?

NF: I remember seeing the statistics a while ago and while the majority of teachers are women in the private sector, that's not the case in government schools.

I may be biased here but I think a lot of the problems in the world stem from not having enough women in leadership positions. Women are just that much more compassionate, or maybe are just less egoistic. I really would love to see more female leaders, not just in the education sector but across the world.

Schools like Inventure are great as far as that is concerned. Our entire leadership team is made up of women! We are really creating a lot of opportunities for women to have more faith in themselves, to take themselves more seriously, and to understand that what they do as teachers isn't just a pastime, it is a profession and a vocation - and one that has a tremendous impact on a lot of people.

Arya: What do you believe makes a great Inventure teacher?

NF: Being compassionate, really helping every child find a path to success and the freedom to figure themselves out. Having teachers who believe in you is critical because everybody has something positive in them. When I think back to my own time as a student, the teachers who really stood out were the ones who accepted me for who I was. They helped me find opportunities to explore, without fear of failure. My school's Vice Principal was quite feared by all my classmates, but he taught me how to stand up to bullies, helped me pursue my passion for sport and taught me self-discipline.

In college (+2 & under-grad), I had 2% attendance! When the teachers complained to the Vice Principal, she told them, "If you make your classes more interesting, she'll come to class!"

I made up my attendance through sports, organizing cultural events, etc. And frankly, that was the best education that I could've had. When I was in school, education inside the classroom was all about memorizing stuff that was in the textbook, and you didn't need to go to school to do that!

These teachers understood me as a person and allowed me to explore. Today, that understanding, compassion, and will to help every child find a path to success is what I expect from every teacher at Inventure.

Yash: Looking forward, what do you think is in store for the next 15 years, the next phase of Inventure?

NF: The immediate thing is to continue to improve the online learning experience.

Next on the to-do list is working on a blended model of online and offline school for when restrictions are lifted. We're actually in talks with a team from the University of Pennsylvania to see if they can help us with that.

Third on the list is setting up another two schools. We really want more people - students & teachers to benefit from the Inventure way of education. We want to make a success of the Ramagondanahalli school, to expand the Inventure educational approach to the government school level.

Yash: A message to the Inventure community - students, teachers, parents, staff, alumni...

NF: Just two things. One - don't forget to be human, just enjoy the journey. And two, make the most of every moment, seize the day, Carpe Diem!




"Live simple, die simple, do good"

INVENTURE'S CHAIRMAN AND CO-FOUNDER, MR.
IRFAN RAZACK, GAVE AN EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW TO
CDC ABOUT THE SCHOOL, HIS ROOTS, AND SOME OF
HIS PHILOSOPHIES.

YASH: HOW HAS YOUR OWN EDUCATIONAL BACKGROUND INSPIRED OR INFLUENCED THE FOUNDING OF INVENTURE ACADEMY?

Irfan Razack: Personally, I was quite fortunate. During my school days, I had peers and teachers with whom I shared a mutual trust. Trust building is important, because it builds confidence. I've always believed that every young person has potential - it's just how you put things across. If you inspire confidence, they just fly. I wasn't just taught book knowledge - I had plenty of extracurricular activities like sports and scouts. Open forums like these, competing with only our skills, were what gave us such an all round education.

It was this that I wanted to introduce to Inventure. Today, schools are getting increasingly boxed in to classrooms, with little else. The idea wasn't just to start a school, but to create an environment where children could develop confidence, with a foundation in caring for society, demonstrating empathy for people, and for the environment. It is not about just cramming young people with knowledge - because in today's world, knowledge is plentiful - but to teach them how to cultivate and use that knowledge to improve the world.



SAHANA: IT APPEARS THAT YOU HAD A WONDERFUL PLAN FROM THE VERY START AND YOU FORESAW THAT SUCCESS COMING TO LIFE. WHAT, IN YOUR OPINION, ARE THE EXACT INGREDIENTS FOR SUCCESS?

IR: The ingredients of success are focus, commitment, sense of direction, and purpose. If you don't have a purpose, you're directionless. You can't succeed. We were fortunate enough to have a goal, and people who were capable of seeing it through. We had, and still have, a fabulous team, who rally together to achieve success. Those who weren't on board with our purpose moved away early on, but those who stayed did so because they truly believed in the direction we were going.



ARYA: DO YOU HAVE A PHILOSOPHY ON LIFE THAT YOU'D LIKE TO SHARE?

IR: Live simple, die simple, do good, and don't have too many expectations from life. But once you set a goal, you have to go after it aggressively. Bring honesty and integrity into whatever you do, but strive to be the best you can - make sure you can deliver on your promises. There are no half-measures in life. Mediocrity has no place in life, only excellence and passion.



YASH: I THINK TEACHERS PLAY A HUGE ROLE IN INCULCATING THAT PASSION IN US. WHAT ELSE, IN YOUR OPINION, MAKES A GREAT TEACHER?

IR: A great teacher is someone who can get the best out of you. Everybody has their strengths and weaknesses, but I've always believed a teacher should only look at your strengths. They should ignore any weaknesses, unless they see weaknesses that can be converted into strengths. A teacher has to inculcate confidence. If you're nervous or apprehensive, a teacher needs to be able to invoke confidence and reassurance. It's not just about imparting information - it's about showing - and believing - that you that you can conquer the world.

SAHANA: HOW DO YOU SEE INDIA'S ECONOMIC GROWTH IMPACTING THE EDUCATION INDUSTRY IN THE FUTURE?

IR: I think growth and education are two different things. Unfortunately, in India, there's a lot of bureaucratic interference, that doesn't leave us free to do what we could do or what we want to do. It should be a free economy - free enough to allow people to bring in centers of excellence. If you keep on choking centres of excellence, it creates a situation where everyone goes to other countries to get their graduate or postgraduate education. There are quotas, caps on fees, so many regulations. Over-regulations kill the economy, kill freedom, and kill the growth of good institutions. There are good institutions, such as the IIMs and the IITs, but these are all government owned. If we can get more of those, privately, it would be massively beneficial.


Right now, what we need is a freer environment, where we can have a proliferation of institutions. Then, only the best will stand out - institutions that provide bad or expensive education will eventually die out.

I think the only reason India hasn't entirely succeeded, despite all the brilliant minds we have, is because there is a lack of honesty in politics. Nothing will change until that changes. This is a shame, since we have the intelligence and the manpower to become a superpower. And it's the young people who need to make that happen.

ARYA: IF YOU HAD TO OFFER ANY ADVICE TO SOMEONE GRADUATING RIGHT NOW, WHAT WOULD IT BE?

R: Have a goal, be sincere, and most importantly, believe in yourself. Believe in what you want to do. You won't necessarily succeed every time. But if you tell yourself that "This will happen, I will make it happen", you have the potential to make it happen. Just don't give up. A lot of youngsters try once or twice and then give into complacency, knowing their parents will provide for them. But success isn't just money. It's the satisfaction of doing what you want to do. If you can, take care of others. The more you give, the more you get. The more you get, the more you can give. You should be selfless rather than selfish.

Learn to share.



YASH: DO YOU THINK INVENTURE TODAY IS DIFFERENT FROM WHAT YOU HAD INITIALLY IMAGINED 15 YEARS AGO? IF SO, IS IT A GOOD DIFFERENCE?

IR: The only thing I felt bad about is where Inventure is located. It's sad to watch kids get up at 6 am and travel long distances through Bangalore traffic to get to school. In fact, we had considered making Inventure a boarding school, but that would've been a different responsibility altogether. Other than that, Inventure today is exactly how we had imagined it. The entire goal was to set up an institution that makes a qualitative difference, not just a quantitative one. And I think we've accomplished that goal. Overall, Inventure has flourished and that gives me immense satisfaction. I must give credit to the entire team for making Inventure what it is today and what it will be tomorrow.



FOUNDING FACULTY

Three of Inventure's veteran faculty members Ms. Preet Benjamin, Ms. Varsha Saxena and Ms. Radhika Surendran recall the early days of Inventure and reflect on their experiences
with the school.



MS. PREET BENJAMIN

Ms. Preet Benjamin explains that there have been so many amazing memories of the school's founding and growth that it's hard to just pick just one. "I remember a pond that our first students built at the Martin Farm...we started school there since our building wasn't ready. Students dug a circular hole about 5 feet in diameter and then started pouring water in. To their bafflement, the water was not filling up, it kept disappearing!

"Eventually they understood that they had to waterproof it with cement to retain the water."

She adds that the process of learning through exploration was evident and has come to be a hallmark of teaching at Inventure, starting with Inventuring!

Ms. Benjamin recalls that very first day at Inventure.

"On 14 July 2005 it rained hard and the school resembled a muddy bog - but that didn't deter the Trustees, and the first batch of students and teachers from the inauguration. The excitement was palpable!

"It was the start of something very new and special - rain certainly wasn't going to dampen our determination to embark on an exciting journey! The attitude was - ' Bring it on! Inventure is here!'"

Ms. Benjamin adds another memory from 2010, which remains vivid today. "One of our students won the Boys A division 100 mts sprint in great style! He was not just any student - he was diagnosed with a disorder so kept to himself most of the time, he ate only dry chapatis for lunch everyday and talked himself on occasion. It was beautiful inspirational moment; cried unashamedly because through sheer hard work this guy defeated crippling introversion triumph on the sports field. For me, that's what Inventure stands for: the quest for excellence and overcoming our shortcomings to find an area that we can excel in - and that can be in anything!"

When it comes to change and growth, Ms Benjamin believes that Inventure has seen a huge change in the approach to learning and the definition of school. She explains that circa 2005, it was all about marks and performance.

"Students were/are achieving results like 98 and 99% in their Board Exams and that was the entire goal of school. At present, soft skills and life skills are popularly acknowledged as important parameters of school success.

"Very slowly, schools are realising that a purely content driven approach (which is redundant due to information, courses and degrees being freely available and accessible on the internet) is not enough and that school needs to focus on developing the whole person and other skills for success."

Ms. Benjamin is proud that Inventure is a school that walks the talk! She said.

"Whether it's 'Nurture Inventive Thinking', or 'A balanced approach', or 'The happiest school', or 'New World. New Learning.' - we do what we say, and the proof lies in the incredible feedback from students. parents, faculty. Apart from that - I truly think that our achievement is the creation of a warm, nurturing environment - a school that teaches with love and understanding, acknowledging every student and teachers' individuality achieves and aspires that excellence in every aspect."

When considering what makes unique, Benjamin Inventure Ms shares what prospective parents cite for wanting their reasons Inventure as their school of choice. model for whole person development and holistic learning - a lot of schools make this claim, but Inventure's has been able to ensure that every child gets equal exposure and access to every opportunity whether its in Beyond Academics or Academics.

Choice is also an integral aspect of the Inventure Approach. Dismissed in the early days as a 'sports school', Inventure has shown that we stand for excellence in all areas."

Ms. Benjamin states that as a happy school Inventure has changed the notion that school had to be a place of rules, discipline, truckloads of homework, conformity and uniformity. She explains, "Inventure is a caring school where students feel safe - both emotionally and physically. There is a freedom to be. Finally, there is 'Thinking & Learning to learn' - the emphasis on academic programmes and approaches to teaching that encourage students to understand, apply their learning, make connections and explore, experiment, discover, invent and. These are hallmarks of the Inventure Way of Teaching and Learning."

As for the future? "The Best is yet to come! Be a part of our journey - stay connected!"

One of the founding staff members of Inventure Academy, Varsha Saxena, Head of Finance and Administration shares some insights into her fifteen years at Inventure.



Smiling warmly, she explains that every day at Inventure is full of good memories, starting with the inauguration of the school and the planning that went into welcoming the first students back in 2005 and the very first production entitled "The Big Bang," that was presented in the Hub.

"I love seeing happy students and faculty members every day," explained Ms. Varsha, "Inventure is very much a school with a heart, something that is obvious from the positive vibes one gets upon entering the campus. For us every person at school is special and we believe in each and every individual."

Ms Varsha is especially proud of the way Inventure has grown from a small start up school to being recognised as one of India's leading educational establishments with a student body of over 1200. She explains part of the School's success can be attributed to its ability to adapt to change by growing and evolving, evidenced by its recent adaptation to an outstanding online She concludes, programme. would like to offer a big thank you to our entire Inventure family of staff, students, parents and alumni for making Inventure what it is today. It would not have been possible for the school to achieve its outstanding success without each one of you."



MS. RADHIKA SURENDRAN

"An Inventure veteran, Ms. Radhika from the Centre of Excellence and Lead Theme Based Learning fondly recalls her first days at Inventure. "We started planning group activities; little did we know that there were no students. One day, I was called to Nooraine's office to discuss with potential parents why Inventure would be the right choice for their child....Tanuj Lalwani was our first student."

Receiving a crash course in marketing when she had to recruit students in December of 2005, Ms Radhika explains that she was a teacher who loved teaching. This passion translated into the enrollment of lots of students. She adds, "I feel happy that I was instrumental in getting our first student and also increasing the student population the following years. I remember an Assembly in the second year when I saw the number of students sitting, I couldn't fight back the tears of joy for increasing our tribe. To this day, when there is a whole school assembly at the hub, I am filled with emotions as I go down the memory lane ...from no kids to 1200 and more kids."

Ms. Radhika had loved seeing Inventure grow in every aspect, from the academic pedagogy to the infra-structure. "The greatest change I personally like is the production. The very first year, we had a Pod presentation in the junior amphitheater. It was simple and was very sweet. Back then, whenever we had a presentation and invited parents, it would rain...even if it was summer. The next year, we did a home grown production and the play was written by Shaheen and Sinduja. We staged this play in St. Johns auditorium. Although I don't remember much of the play it was nice to see so many students on stage. Today, our productions are sophisticated and professional where students showcase myriad talents."

Ms. Radhika reflects that Inventure used to be considered an experimental 'sports school' due to its out-of-the-box philosophies and initiatives. This included programmes such as Theme Based Learning (an interdisciplinary approach to learning) which was unheard of 15 years ago. "BA ranged from pottery, music, dance, different types of sport, etc. Some people felt that the school was more a fun place than a school." She explains, "Now I see that the world appreciates the value of a vision and a system that encourages thinking, expression, and physical and emotional wellbeing. People have realized that such an education helps students be change-makers, innovators, and thinkers. Above all, people have realized that Inventure students are confident, happy, reflective and intelligent. That, I think, is our greatest achievement. Another feather in our cap is that more and more schools around the globe want to learn and implement our approach to learning and focus on the all-round development of students rather than just academic achievement."

She concludes that education at Inventure is an enjoyable experience. "Enjoy the journey and discover yourself".
